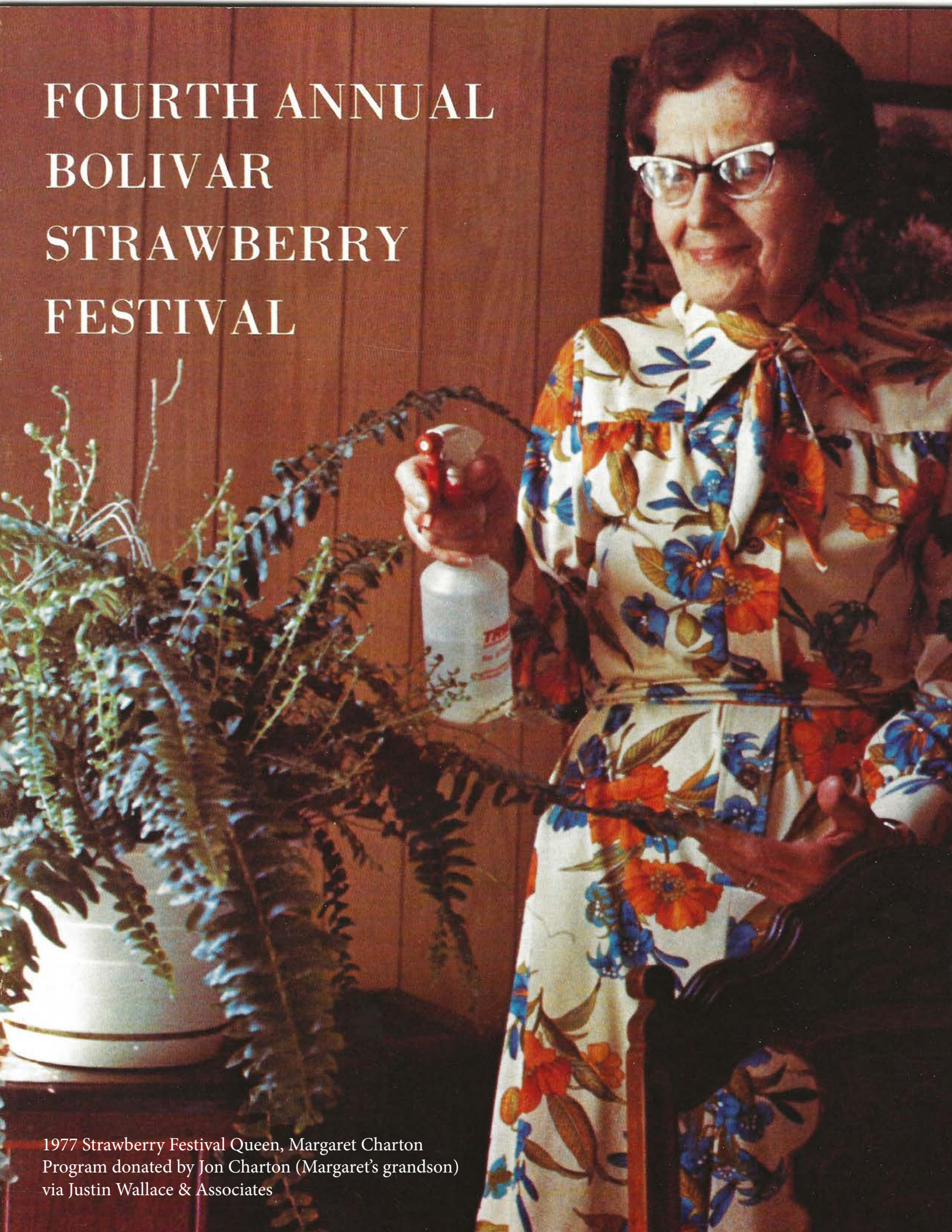

Once again it is strawberry time in Bolivar. Strawberry shortcake, strawberry pie, strawberry sundaes, strawberry jam -- Bolivar has them all June 26th at the 4th Annual Strawberry Festival. The berries are served with nostalgia, when with long skirts and sun bonnets, suspenders and beards, Bolivar turns back the calendar nearly one hundred years to relive the community celebrations of the 1890's.

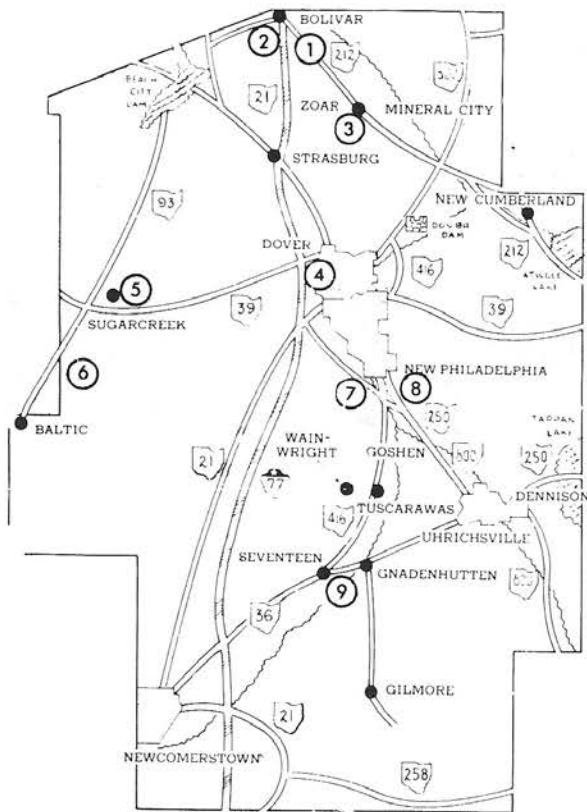

Points Of Interest

1. BOLIVAR, originally a canal town and focal point for area trade, this beautiful Ohio village is now the site of the annual STRAWBERRY FESTIVAL.
2. FORT LAURENS, site of Ohio's only Revolutionary War fort, has been maintained as a state memorial since 1915. A museum and mini-theater are open to the public.
3. ZOAR VILLAGE was founded by a group of German Separatists in 1819, as a communal society. The Ohio Historical Society maintains a museum and formal gardens which are open to the public.
4. WARTHER MUSEUM contains a display of world-famous, hand-carved steam locomotives, trains and other intricate carvings by "world's master carver" Ernest Warther.
5. OHIO'S CHEESE INDUSTRY is centered primarily in the Sugarcreek area. Eighteen cheese factories are located within ten miles of the village.
6. AMISH settlements are found primarily in the Sugarcreek-Baltic area of Western Tuscarawas County. A close-knit, deeply religious farm people, the Amish first settles in America in 1727.
7. SCHOENBRUNN VILLAGE is a state memorial and reconstruction of a village established in 1772, by Moravian missionary David Zeisberger and Christian Indians. Plotted in the form of a cross, the site contains cabins, a schoolhouse and church and is open to the public.
8. TRUMPET IN THE LAND, written by Pulitzer Prize winner Paul Green, is Ohio's official bicentennial play and revolves around Zeisberger's settlement at Schoenbrunn and the Revolutionary War.
9. GNADENHUTTEN is the site of the massacre of ninety Christian Indians by Pennsylvania militiamen during the Revolutionary War. The site contains a cemetery, "Triumph In Death" monument and museum.

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POST OFFICE

As a young woman, Mrs. Dorothy App worked in the post office for her father, postmaster Milton Willard. She recalls that six mail deliveries were received daily, and that the post office was open until 9 p.m. on Saturday so that farmers could pick up their mail when they left the barbershop.

BOLIVAR OR KELLEYSVILLE?

The village of Bolivar has borne its name since 1825. According to Roland Kline, the settlers first called it Kelleysville after canal commissioner Alfred Kelley, but he declined the honor. Simon Bolivar, the general who led much of South America in its fight for independence from Spain, was a very popular public figure in those days, so the town was given his name.

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CANOEING ON THE CANAL

Mrs. Helen Detrich and a girl friend, Harriet "Hattie" Gibler, wearing the dark, heavy, ankle-length skirts and white puff-sleeved shirtwaists then fashionable, used to paddle a canoe down the Tuscarawas River as far as Zoar, then cross over to the calm water of the canal for the trip home. In retrospect, Mrs. Detrich wonders at their daring. "Why, my mother must have been out of her mind with worry. With those long skirts on, if one of us had fallen in . . . that would have been it."

There were several small islands along the way where the young women could pause for rest. Grape Vine Island was covered with wild vines which looped from tree to tree, here and there drooping low enough to serve as swings.

On the ribbon of land between the river and the canal, stood an old log cabin. Long deserted, the place was the site of countless pioneer fantasies for local children.

The canal in those days wasn't grown up in brush and weeds as it is now. The towpath was clear, of course, and meadows reached to the river bank. A Sunday stroll or bicycle ride beside the water to Zoar was not uncommon.



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VISIT HISTORIC FT. LAURENS



Ft. Laurens memorial and museum, a quarter mile south of Bolivar on County Rd. 102, is located on the site of a Revolutionary War Outpost. Ft. Laurens was built in December 1778 by 1200 men of the 9/13th Virginia and 8th Pennsylvania regiments under the command of Gen. Lachlin McIntosh, who was sent out by General Washington to protect the new nation's western frontier from British encroachment.

The men suffered from lack of food and fuel that winter. They also struggled under British-incited Indian harassment in the form of sniping and ambushes. The fort was abandoned in August 1789, but not without having served a useful purpose. It distracted the British from all-out raids on western-most Virginia and Pennsylvania settlements and gave the American forces time to make a substantial fortification supply base at Ft. Pitt.

Ft. Laurens, named for the president of the Continental Congress, became a state memorial in 1915. In a nationally recognized ceremony last June, the fort became the site of the nation's only memorial to an unknown Revolutionary War Soldier.

The museum contains artifacts from the fort site, lifelike manikins of militiamen and soldiers, and various weapons and accoutrements. In its center is a multi-screen, 44-foot amphitheater where a 20 minute audio-visual explanation of the fort's history is presented. Museum summer hours are 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday, and 1 to 6 p.m. Sunday.



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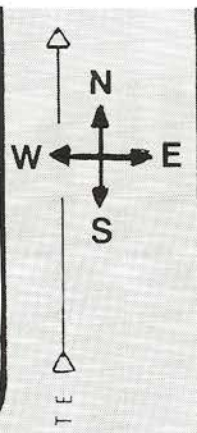

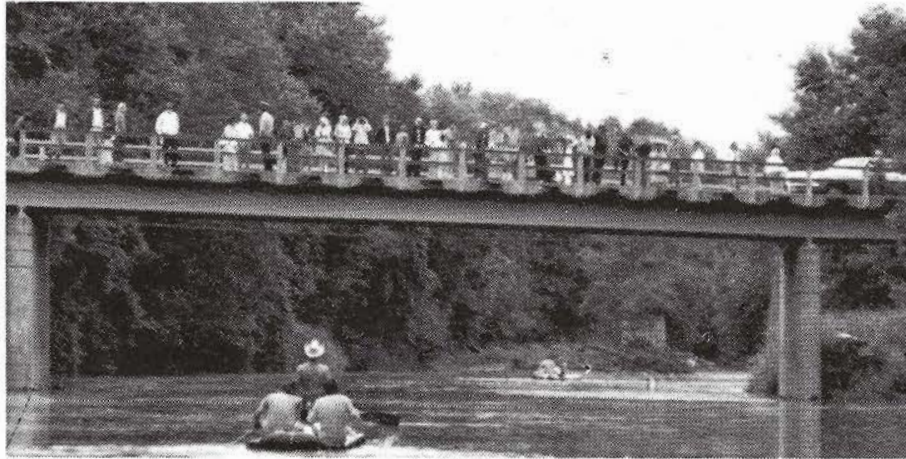

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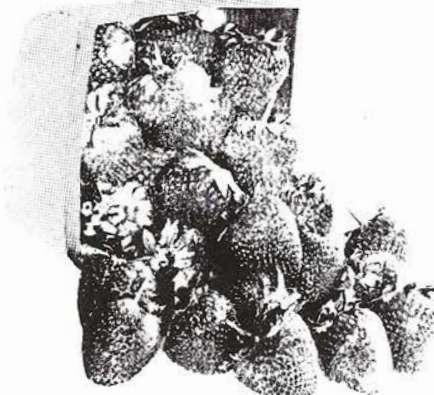
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POPULATION/CANAL BOYHOOD

According to Mickey Willard, Bolivar in 1888 had a population of 800 and boasted four churches. The village was not incorporated as a municipality until 1900.

Willard remembers lazy summer days spent in and on the canal. In the cool morning hours the boys fished; as the day began to heat up, they switched to swimming. He recalls the sheriff being called to discourage skinny dippers from diving off the route 212 bridge. And one spot was the site for a traditional Easter swim, regardless of the weather.

In the summer of 1914, Willard says, the water in the canal dropped so low, that Bolivar residents rescued fish from shallow pools and transferred them to the river.



BASEBALL

A main enthusiasm in Bolivar before World War I was the village baseball team. Charles Hammel says Cy Young belonged to the Bolivar Mason Lodge; perhaps his visits fired locally the national passion for the game. The village team played all the little towns around and had a very respectable win-loss record.

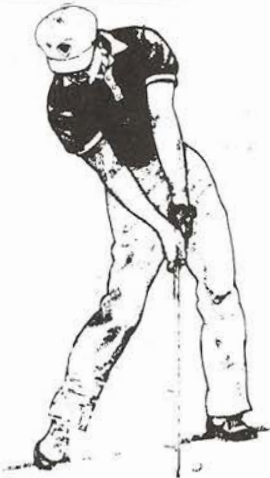
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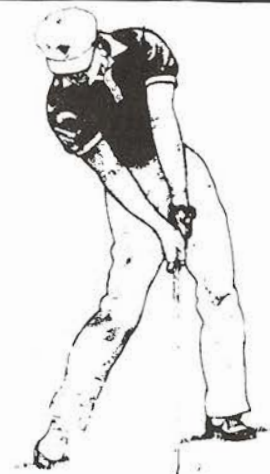
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NEWSPAPER/JULY 4

Adrian Helwick has a fragile copy of the first issue of the "Bolivar Loyal", the weekly newspaper published by Milton Willard. The paper was first printed Dec. 15, 1910 by E.E. Wagner in his print shop above what is now Cochran's Bakery. The village was unable to support a newspaper for long.

Helwick also saved a series of brittle posters advertising 4th of July celebrations in the late 1800's. They announce activities including fireworks, games, band concerts, speeches and oratory contests, the reading the Declaration of Independence, and, of course, a community picnic. In 1882 a balloon ascension was scheduled. Each year the festivities were held at "the grove"; unfortunately no one can remember exactly which grove that might have been, but the best guess seems to be Kline's grove north of town.

SOCIAL LIFE

Mr. & Mrs. Helwick remember an active community social life in Bolivar. Around 1910-1912, there were annual village excursions to Meyers Lake or Silver Lake. Carrying large wicker baskets of food, participants boarded the train in the morning, and, after a full day of open-air amusements, returned by rail in the evening.

Once every summer, too, St. John's Evangelical Church (originally the German Church and now St. John's United Church of Christ) sponsored a village picnic at a park south of the old Zoar cemetery. Hay wagons carried Bolivar residents to the site, where, in addition to the permanent tables and rain shelter, refreshment stands and game booths had been set up for the event.

CANAL LIFE/RAILROADS

The last year Wilson Lundenberger worked on the canal boats, he was thirteen and drove the team. Traveling from Cleveland to Cochocton, the barge carried 80 tons of coal north and lumber south. Lundenberger says other boats brought in wheat from Pennsylvania. According to him, little boating was done after

the locks were repaired in 1907.

Lundenberger worked as a bridge carpenter for the railroad until World War I, and recalls the busy village depot well. He says that in those years, two passenger trains each way ran every day, in addition to considerable freight traffic.



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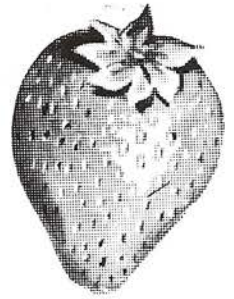
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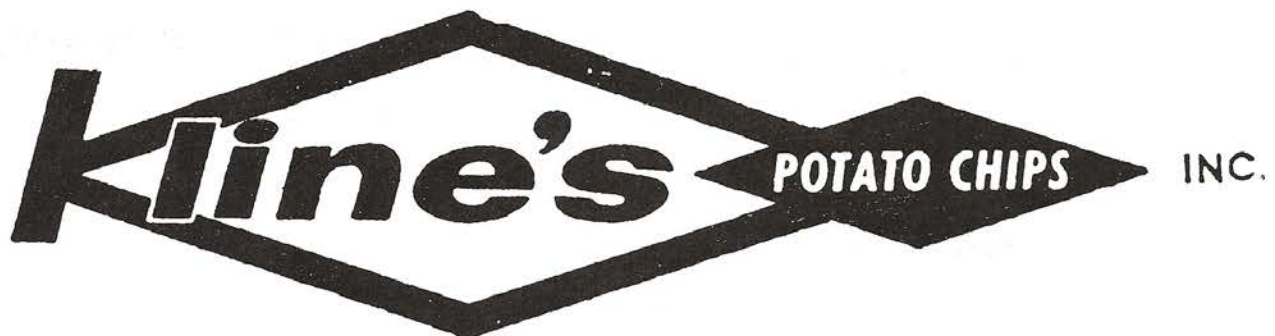
Rt. 212 Between Bolivar & Zoar

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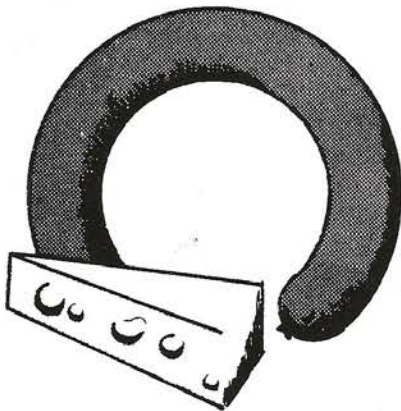
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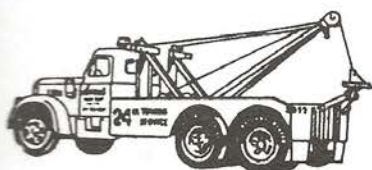


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
